STUDIO BACKGROUND, GOALS AND APPROACH

Building on the investigation of infrastructure and public space in the first Studio, the second Studio gives students the opportunity to work at a variety of urban scales. The studio will focus on Hong Kong's New Territories, examining the interface between regional infrastructure and local placemaking initiatives.

In recent years Hong Kong has struggled to generate consensus around a vision for the New Territories. The challenges facing the region are often framed in terms of constricted supply of developable land. This has prompted several ambitious responses, including a proposal to construct a new CBD on artificial islands in the eastern waters of Lantau Island. Yet there has been little meaningful progress in the absence of a shared vision for the region. Agricultural

lands lie vacant and unused. Settlements from indigenous villages to new towns have failed to adapt and expand for a new generation.

In June 2019, as part of the World Urban Campaign, CUHK hosted an Urban Thinkers Campus, bringing together a diverse group of local stakeholders to discuss the future of the New Territories. There was consensus across the community that the new islands alone would not sufficiently address Hong Kong's spatial needs. The forum identified opportunities to unlock complex planning and ownership arrangements enabling a variety of strategically located sites at scales suited to the production of inclusive and participatory urban space.

The studio will begin with a strategic research phase, then develop a series of visionary scenarios and pilot schemes to reframe the New Territories. These collaborative frameworks will form the basis of group and individual studio projects. Reflecting on the new town model, students will be challenged to envision a more human centric approach based on a wider understanding of infrastructure, enabling a more equitable city that promotes social mobility. Such proposals will implicitly address related issues ranging from blue and green infrastructure, inclusive public space and liveability, to participatory infrastructure design and urban regeneration.

The studio will employ processes of urban analysis and scenario building that are informed by placemaking values and community participation. Students will be empowered to reconsider innovative and ecologically reasonable strategies and create a comprehensive set of urban scenarios for the New Territories, that offer genuine alternatives for public consideration.

OBJECTIVES OF THE DESIGN STUDIO

- To create a contextual and vibrant urban design, with focus on increasing living quality, social interaction and economic vitality;
- To create a Conceptual Plan and study schemes indicating land use with program layout;
- To identify and understand how existing urban areas have emerged and are currently transforming;
- To develop strategies to improve and enhance the neighbourhood's economic vitality and sustainability;
- To explore new opportunities for integrated infrastructure planning to guide the development of more cost-effective and resilient green infrastructure investments over time;
- To create a comprehensive urban design strategy to integrate the new development into the existing context.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOME

Upon completing the studio, students will be able to:

- Understand how to organize a sustainable development strategy that will integrate economic, social and environmental perspectives;
- Understand, map and interpret the urban morphology of an important part of Hong Kong.

- Understand the complex relationships between enhancing urban mobility and environmental, economic and social sustainability;
- Learn from key examples of Urban Design;
- Create a comprehensive urban design strategy by learning to work in different scales in the fields of architecture, urban design and city planning;
- Understand and address contemporary urban issues with focus on development of advanced urban design, presentation and communication skills while addressing key issues and developing context sensitive strategies and designs;
- Determine priorities and strategies to create an urban ecosystem.
